# about me and my friends



There are different kinds of flying foxes, just like there are different types of dogs or cats.

In the Port Macquarie-Hastings there are 3 different types (or species) of flying-foxes. We are all a type of **megabat**.

I am a Grey-headed flying fox
I have dark grey fur on my body and legs,
light grey fur on my head
and orange fur around my neck.

My body grows up to 29cm and my wings can stretch over 1 metre!

This is Bertie, a Black flying-fox
Black flying-foxes are almost completely black
but have a tiny bit of orange on their collar.
They can grow as big as me.





Then there's Ren, the Little Red
Little Red flying-foxes can grow to 20cm.
They have lots of red rust colour
and brown on their bodies and wings.





# sleeping upside down



## Did you know flying-foxes sleep upside down?

We are very social and like to spend time together in our home. We call our home a camp.

We are **nocturnal**, which means we sleep in the day. We huddle together in groups (this is called roosting). We sleep hanging from tree branches by our toes.

### Our hard work helps our environment.

When we fly from tree to tree in search of nectar and fruit, we carry pollen on our fur and spread it to different flowers. This helps plants make seeds and grow more trees, which provides homes and food for other animals.

#### We can spread up to 60,000 seeds in one night! We are keystone pollinators for the Eucalypt tree.

By helping Eucalypt trees produce seeds, we play a crucial role in the survival of our furry friends, the koalas, as these trees are their main home and source of food.
